

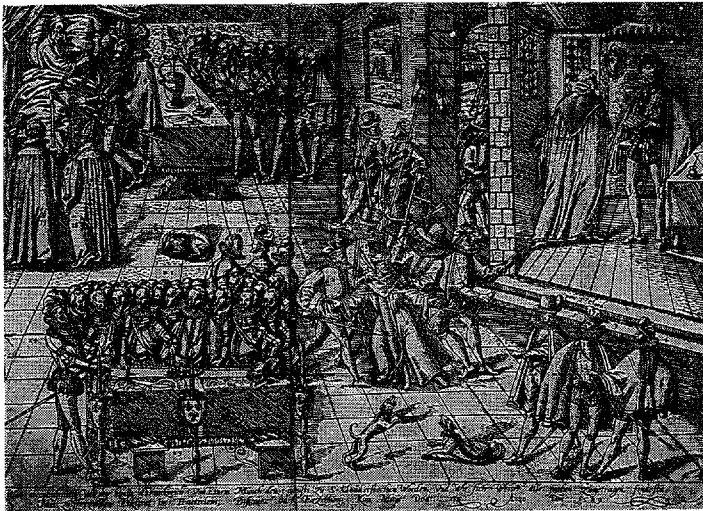

## 「ジャーナリズムの源流」

—上野文庫展示会—

本学会は、1988年11月15日から22日にわたり、日曜日（休館）をはさんで7日間、附属図書館展示ホールで「ジャーナリズムの源流」をテーマに、主に上野文庫所蔵の新聞関係資料の展示会を開催した。この展示会は、1989年に本学部創設後70周年を迎えるにあたって、創設70周年記念行事の一環として催されたものであり、秋の定例の経済学会の開催と併行して開かれたものである。

上野文庫は、朝日新聞前社主・上野精一翁（1882-1970）が、新聞社運営のかたわら、生涯にわたって蒐集された和洋書あわせて約26,500冊もの膨大な図書からなる。本文庫の展示は、寄贈の行われ始めて間もなく、1959年5月21-23日の3日間、経済学部創設40周年を記念して旧附属図書館で開催されたことがあるが、今回はその後寄贈された冊数が余りにも多数にのぼったこともあって、本文庫の特色たる新聞関係にしばって展示することとした。この展示会の狙いは、次のとおりである。



まず、第一に上野精一翁は新聞社の経営者であるとともに、すぐれて新聞の蒐集、および新聞・雑誌等の歴史の研究者でもあった。しかも翁の研究の重点は、新聞の発展史を通じて、言論・出版の自由と公論の意義や新聞の使命を解明することにあつた。本文庫の最大の特色は、この新聞の現物が多数収められており、ことに新聞の母国イギリスの新聞が多いことであろう。このさい、わが国の新聞もかなりあるが、これは割愛することにして、主にヨーロッパで16世紀末から19世紀の初期にかけて発行された新聞・雑誌に限った。なかでも、17世紀のイギリスのピューリタン革命期から名譽革命期にかけての新聞、およびその後イギリスの議会政治の発展にともなう18世紀の新聞・雑誌の蒐集は圧巻である。

第二に、この展示会の狙いが「言論・出版の自由」にあつたので、これにまつわる冊子、ことにジョン・ミルトンの「アレオパジチカ」など数点を展示しておいた。それとともに、最近、御遺族・上野淳一現社主からいただいたイギリスの政治家や思想家の自筆の書簡が21通も所蔵されているので、その中から、St. J. ボーリングブルック、E. パーク、W. ゴドウィン、J. S. ミルの5人の書簡を展示してみた。

第三には、翁がどのようにして文献や資料を集められたか、また、どのようにして新聞史の研究を行われたのかを、うかがい知るよすがとして、ノート類だとか翁の執筆された原稿や出版された書物をお借りして並べてみた。最後になったが、小磯良平画伯の筆になる見事な翁の肖像（複製）をかかげて、生前の翁をしのぶこととした。

以下、当日展示した目録のタイトルを記しておく。なお、この展示会については、「上野文庫」(『静修』, Vol. 25, No. 2) に詳しく書いておいたし、上野文庫展示目録「ジャーナリズムの源流」(解題つき目録)を作つて、閲覧者に配布した。閲覧者数は約700名にのほり盛会であつた。最後になったが、貴重な資料をお貸しいただいた、上野淳一社主、およびこの催しを積極的に推進してくれた、松田博・司書に厚く御礼申し上げます。
