Preface

Most of the articles in this volume are based on talks at the 55th International Conference on Sino-Tibetan Languages and Linguistics (ICSTLL-55) held from September 15th to 18th, 2022. ICSTLL-55 was supported by JSPS KAKENHI Grant Number (S) 18H5219, “*A Study on the Historical Development of the Sino-Tibetan Languages and their Typological Geography*” (headed by IKEDA Takumi) and held at Kyoto University. This volume primarily includes the research findings presented at ICSTLL-55 and includes articles on the “Typology and Historical Changes of Sino-Tibetan Languages.” More than 80 scholars presented their research findings at the ICSTLL in Kyoto, with a wide range of reports spanning various language families such as Tibeto-Burman, Sinitic, Kra-Dai, and Hmong-Mien.

In the summer of 2022, when COVID-19 had not yet been contained, researchers based in Japan came to the venues and mostly made in-person reports, whereas those who were not based in Japan mostly presented their reports online. Those who were able to report in person included researchers based in Europe and the U.S. who happened to be in Japan for sabbatical leave or other purposes.
